The Scottish Community Pharmacy Network



Scottish Community Pharmacy Network

- 1244 Independently owned or CCA (Large chains)
- Size, business mix and hours of premises vary widely
- Distribution aligned to population density and need for services
 - Control of Entry is regulated

We are exactly where we need to be in communities





Key Objectives for Community Pharmacy Network to Meet

- Deliver quality, person centred services for patients and carers
- Provide better access/equality of access to care
- Improve the public's health
- Funding linked to services





Pharmacy Teams

- No two teams the same
- Must have a Pharmacist
 - Qualified and registered
 - Can be an independent prescriber
 - Each business has a superintendent
- Pharmacy Technician
 - · With or without accuracy checking
- Dispensers
- Pharmacy assistants
- Delivery drivers

A Brief History of Pharmacy



- We largely filled prescriptions until the early '00s
- Minor ailments service launched 2006
- Allowed us to supply over the counter medications free of charge following consultation (at the time for people who were in receipt of free prescriptions)
- E.g. head lice no longer required GP appointment to get treatments and could be treated in the pharmacy.







Where We Are Now



- NHS Pharmacy First Scotland launched in July 2020 (height of pandemic!)
- Consultation-based service for common conditions, available to all except visitors to Scotland
- Everyone who accesses the service will receive advice on self-care
- If appropriate, medication from a select list can be supplied
- Onward referral can also be recommended





But That's Not All...



In addition to the over the counter medications, protocols were written to allow pharmacists to prescribe in specific conditions including:


- Urinary tract infections in women
- Shingles
- Skin infections
- Impetigo (Specific skin infection)
- Hayfever

As of January 2023, over 5 million consultations have been carried out.




NHS Pharmacy First Funding Model

- Each pharmacy receives a 'base' payment for service delivery, which is the same for all pharmacies.
- There is an 'activity pool' made available for those whose activity exceeds 100 weighted consultations
- An 'activity' will count as a single consultation, referral or supply, with activities involving PGD use carrying more weight to reflect additional work







 Pharmacies delivering over 100 activities/interventions will receive an activity pool payment directly proportional to their workload

Base funding

 All pharmacies receive the same base payment for making the service available to their community





NHS Pharmacy First Plus Service





Pharmacy First Plus

- In extension of NHS Pharmacy First Scotland
- Makes use of Independent Prescribing qualification and advanced consultation/assessment skills that some pharmacists have undertaken
- IP qualification allows Pharmacists to prescribe in any area that they are competent and confident in
- NHS Pharmacy First Plus provides a world-first opportunity for pharmacist prescribers to see and treat even more acute common conditions than is possible under NHS PFS.
- Come 2026, all newly qualified pharmacists will graduate with IP qualification as part of the Masters Degree.
- With the expectation all community pharmacies in Scotland will provide Pharmacy First Plus by early 2030s.





My Pharmacy Journey

- 8 years community pharmacy experience across Scotland
- The community I served within had both:
 - an aging population
 - a high volume of university students
- Up until recently most of my day looked like this...









But now...







My Pharmacy Journey

- Most of my day was spent in consultation
- Made possible by investment in premises, technology and most importantly my team
- Started my Independent Prescribing Course in 2021 after realising I could use my clinical skills to help more patients.
- Set up Pharmacy First Plus two years ago
- It completely changed my practice, making me more part of the local multidisciplinary healthcare team.

Delivering Pharmacy First Plus



Patients love how accessible we are

Typical day – see around 10-15 patients, mix of referred from GP and self-referrals

No set list of conditions, but competent in and see patients for:

- Ear pain
- Possible chest infections
- Possible throat infections
- Skin conditions

Clinical skills training helps triage when onward referral is needed







In Summary

- Consultations when and where the community needs them
- Clinical triage for other services e.g. GP, Hospital and Out-of-hours services
- Integrates community pharmacy teams into local healthcare team even more than before prescribing
- Incredibly rewarding professionally!





NHS Pharmacy First Plus

- Part of our IP strategy
- Allows Pharmacists to use their Independent Prescribing qualification and advanced consultation skills to see more people and treat more conditions
- Each IP Pharmacist makes service available for minimum of 25 hours per week
- Helps keep people well as close to home as possible
- £3000 pcm for service delivery
- Needs close working relationship with local healthcare team







What Does The Future Look Like?






What does the future look like?

- It is Community Pharmacy Scotland's ambition to have a prescriber in every pharmacy in Scotland
- This will give nearly every community access to care provided on their doorstep and opens up huge opportunity for further development in line with Health policy
- Long-term plan and people are at the very centre of it all
- But how to get there? Big question!



The Numbers





- We have 1,244 community pharmacies across Scotland
- Number of employed pharmacists is trickier
- Number IP-qualified even more so but estimated to be around 300
- No. of CPs currently delivering service: 316, ~25%
- Practitioners tell us a 2-pharmacist model is ideal
- So....you can see there's a bit of a gap!







Pharmacy

Bridging the Gap

- Our regulator (GPhC) has recently shaken things up with initial education and training of Pharmacists
- From 2026, all graduates will come out of University with a prescribing qualification
- For the last few years, CPS (on behalf of pharmacy owners) has invested heavily in training existing pharmacists
- Redirecting funding that would ordinarily be shared between all contractors
- This includes covering the significant cost of releasing them from the day job to do so

Community Pharmacists

- IP in all community pharmacies
- Incorporated into the University Degree
- Qualified pharmacists need to train to gain the qualification.







Challenges

- Significant numbers to train
- Support required
- Workforce
- Current legislation work underway
- Access to patient records
